Research topics (priorities in bold)

Family Violence (FV) Research and Evaluation themes:

## 1. A systems approach to reducing family violence

Objective: To develop system-wide perspectives and evidence to support the reduction of family violence

## 2. Effective programmes and interventions – What Works in NZ including economic analyses

Objective: To develop and implement effective programmes and interventions

## 3. Family violence workforce development

Objective: To gather evidence to support development of an effective and resilient family violence workforce

## 4. Family violence and Māori perspectives

Objective: To understand Māori perspectives on promoting wellbeing and reducing family violence

## 5. Family violence and specific population groups

Objective: To understand family violence in relation to children and young people, seniors, Pasifika, migrant and refugee, disabled and LGBTQI groups

## 6. Family violence perpetrators

Objective: To understand the characteristics of family violence perpetrators and pathways into and out of family violence and offending

## 7. Family violence data collection

Objective: To improve the quality and availability of family violence data

## 8. Different types of family violence and how they inter-relate

Objective: To increase our understanding of the nature of family violence

## 9. Changes in social norms and community attitudes towards the use of family violence

Objective: To assess the impact of family violence prevention measures at community and societal levels
